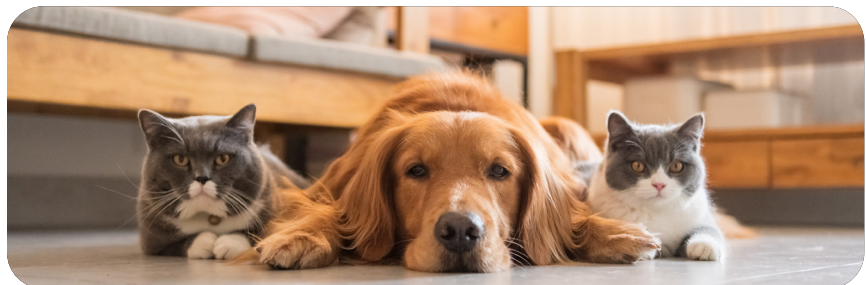

Many pet owners don't realize that every part of a lily is deadly to cats—including the pollen. Even a small amount falling onto their fur can lead to fatal kidney failure when they groom. Keeping lilies out of reach isn't enough—when in doubt, leave lilies out!

Check Those Window Screens!

Many pet owners are unaware of the risks associated with "high-rise syndrome," a condition where cats fall from open windows or balconies. While cats are known for their agility, they don't always land safely. Falls from even a low height can result in broken bones, head trauma, internal injuries, or sprains. Small dogs can also be at risk if they jump up on an unstable screen or lean against an open window.

Watch for Cold Water
